Our Chief Executive's Report

This year has been one of change, challenge and renewed purpose for Sussex Community Foundation. Like many in the voluntary sector, we have felt the effects of a more uncertain funding landscape, with many donors navigating wider global and economic instability. Yet through it all, the strength and creativity of Sussex's communities have continued to inspire us.

At the heart of what we do is connecting people who care with the causes that matter. Our focus on place-based giving ensures funding reaches the grassroots organisations best placed to make a difference. In 2024-25, we are proud to have awarded £2.8 million in 518 grants to 420 small charities and groups across Sussex, supporting local communities during a challenging time.

We've continued to see incredible examples of innovation and collaboration in action. The Chagossian Community Fund, supported by the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO), is helping this marginalised community build capacity and confidence, supported by our dedicated Grants Officer for the fund. The Southern Water Goodwill Fund for Hastings and St Leonards introduced a new model of community-led grant making, empowering local residents to shape priorities and decisions. And the Brighton & Hove Homelessness Fund brought together charities and donors to develop joint projects that address the root causes of homelessness in the city.

This year also saw the publication of our second Sussex Uncovered funding priority report, Reaching Potential, which explores education, training, and employment across the county. The report shines a light on the barriers facing young people – from poor school attendance and mental health challenges to limited access to training and work – and celebrates the brilliant local organisations helping them overcome these obstacles and reach their full potential.

Across Sussex, we continue to meet inspiring people and projects demonstrating the difference local giving can make: youth organisations building confidence and skills; community groups tackling isolation and small charities providing connection and hope. These stories reinforce our belief in the power of community and the importance of investing in it for the long term.

As we look ahead, we remain focused on ensuring the Foundation is sustainable, effective and ready for the future. The Board has reviewed our governance and strategy to help us adapt to a changing environment while staying true to our mission.

And as we approach our 20th anniversary in 2026, we have a special opportunity to reflect on two decades of generosity, collaboration and impact, and to lay the foundations for the next chapter in our work supporting the people and places of Sussex.

Through challenge and change, our purpose endures: to build stronger, more connected communities and make Sussex a place where everyone can thrive.



Tackling poverty.

Reducing poverty and disadvantage in our communities

Too many people across Sussex can't afford to meet their basic needs or take part in their communities. Many find themselves on the margins of society, left behind by a lack of services or support. This funding priority supports grassroots charities and community groups that are tackling poverty and disadvantage.

In 2024-25, we gave 122 grants under our Tackling poverty funding priority totalling £770,463.

Our health and wellbeing are fundamental to our lives. But across Sussex, many people don't get the support they need. This funding priority addresses that gap, by supporting organisations that positively impact local people's physical and mental health and wellbeing.

In 2024-25, we gave 251 grants under our Improving health funding priority totalling £893,857

There is so much untapped potential in Sussex, often among people who face real barriers to their progress. This route addresses that, by reaching and supporting local organisations that build people's skills, confidence and life opportunities.

In 2024-25, we gave 165 grants under our Reaching potential funding priority totalling £881,178.

The climate emergency is a global one, but the effects are also local. The Acting on Climate funding priority helps us reach those in our communities who are both affected by, and taking positive and proactive action on, the climate, nature and biodiversity.

In 2024-25, we gave 52 grants under our Acting on climate funding priority totalling £243,140.
